## Theme - "Together We Win with Love for Humanity"

On April 4, 1968, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., one of the most influential preachers in human history, was killed in Memphis, TN as he advocated for the fair treatment and dignity of that city's sanitation workers. Dr. King's ministry is one of the foremost examples of the social significance of preaching, which transcends the pulpit and the local congregation to transform society at large. In recognition of the transformational nature of Dr. King's life and ministry as well as the continued divine call for socially significant prophetic preaching, the Academy of Preachers joins with preachers around the globe by encouraging all preachers in our network to incorporate the MLK50 Forward theme, "Together We Win with Love for Humanity," in their sermons on April 7 & 8, 2018.
